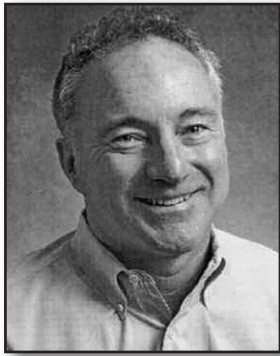

In 1978, several individuals embraced a vision to create an organization that was committed to care for the most vulnerable members of the community regardless of income, disability, or previous failure to achieve recovery. Thirty years later, these principles guide the Serenity House mission as we re-affirm the commitment of the Serenity House founders.

On behalf of the Serenity House of Volusia's Board of Directors and staff, it is truly a pleasure to present you with our leadership message in celebration of our 30 years of contributions to our community. Our organization's success is a direct consequence of the dedicated leadership of our governing Board of Directors who, as volunteers, insure that organizational goals and resources remains focused upon fulfillment of our mission.

However, we recognize that our staff is, and always has been, the fundamental source of our accomplishments. It requires incredible personal and professional commitment to help the most vulnerable members of our community, especially those with the fewest personal and financial resources. We also want to publicly recognize the contributions of our continually expanding base of supporters and friends - some who generously provide financial support, others who donate their time and expertise, and others who advocate for our services.

To all of you, please accept our heartfelt gratitude for your commitment in helping Serenity House evolve into a vital community resource. We extend our most sincere gratitude to each of you for your support and encouragement and pledge to continue providing the highest quality services to the most vulnerable citizens of our community.

We thank you for joining us at this special event and look forward to our future partnership with you as we build upon 30 years of success in "People Helping People".

Notable Accomplishments

Serenity House achievements in the last year include:

Veterans Administration Transitional Housing Project – In November 2007, Serenity House celebrated the opening of a 16 bed transitional housing facility for homeless veterans with histories of post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse, or emotional disorders. The program is currently operating at capacity as a result of our excellent partnership with the VA and local veterans' organizations. This facility and programming is being cited as a state-wide model for replication in the provision of quality services to homeless veterans.

North Stone Street Facility (DeLand) – In partnership with Volusia County, Serenity House was deeded a 76 bed facility located on North Stone Street, DeLand in order to expand substance abuse/mental health treatment services in West Volusia. In December 2007, Serenity House admitted the first clients to this facility and has successfully implemented full programming in expanding services to veterans, homeless, and the dually diagnosed. Priority for admission to this facility is provided to residents of West Volusia. Partnerships with community organizations have been established that allow clients at this facility to receive access to a full range of care.

Leadership on Homelessness Issues – Serenity House staff have remained closely engaged with the Homeless Coalition, local law enforcement, the faith community, and local and state governments in planning and refining our community's response to the growing challenges of homelessness. Sally Ann Groody was a co-author of the area's *10 Year Plan to End Homelessness* which was unanimously endorsed by the Halifax Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

Community Housing Development Projects – Serenity House has become a state model in implementing new safe and affordable housing projects in partnership with local governments. Serenity House currently has developed over 80 safe, affordable community housing beds through this important funding partnership. Sally Ann Groody presented at a housing seminar at the Florida Alcohol and Drug Abuse Annual Conference in August 2007. The Serenity House executive team members have also presented at state-wide workshops on development of affordable housing for low-income individuals and provided consultation to several entities in the establishment of affordable housing in addressing homelessness.

Junior Service League Grant – Our Women's Center received a special grant from the local Junior Service League to assist in the purchase of children's playground equipment in order to enhance our family visitation settings. Thanks to our partners at the Junior League for their ongoing support of our services to women in recovery from addiction.

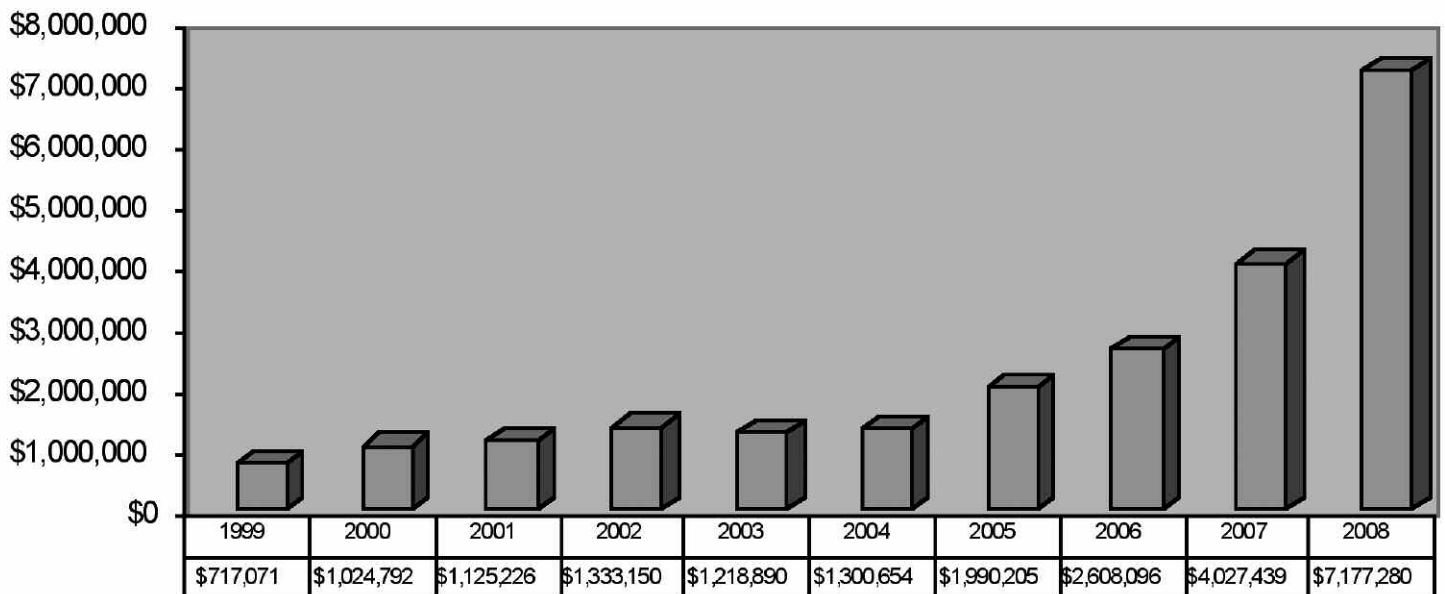
Staff Training / E-Learning – Our staff continue to take advantage of internal opportunities to access specialized trainings provided through our e-learning, computerized learning program. Combined with training opportunities offered by Horizon Health and through attendance at seminars offered by our partner agencies such as Stewart-Marchman-Act Behavioral Healthcare, NEFAN, FADAA, the Homeless Coalition, and Halifax Medical Center, the number of our staff who are certified in their specialties continue to grow.

Notable Accomplishments

Continued

Fundraising and Public Support – During the past twelve months, our supporters have provided a remarkable increase in financial support for our clients and programs. Our Harley fundraiser experienced another successful fundraising campaign in generating over \$400,000 in cash donations. Agency wide in-kind donations of over \$280,000 are used to match federal, state, and local grants. In addition, Serenity House has received generous donations from the Volusia County Sheriff's Law Enforcement Fund, the Pilot Club, multiple American Legion and Veterans of Foreign War posts, the Franciscan Society, the Veterans Support Organization and scores of individual donors. This community support allows Serenity House to provide ancillary services to clients that are not available through traditional treatment funding sources.

Growth of Assets – As we celebrate thirty years of providing services to the most vulnerable individuals in our community, we are proud to note the substantial growth and progress that has taken place. Our assets have increased ten-fold in ten years, as we have expanded permanent and transitional housing opportunities for special needs individuals, veterans and the homeless. We have also increased the scope of services in our system of care and provided increased access to residential treatment for individuals with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health diagnoses in both East and West Volusia.

Opportunities For Enhancement

Collaboration – As securing new treatment funding becomes more challenging, opportunities are emerging for organizations with similar missions to develop partnerships to increase efficiencies and reduce duplication of effort. The Serenity House Board of Directors remains committed to expanding our collaborative partnerships. Halifax Medical Center, Palmer Chiropractic College, and Stewart-Marchman-Act Behavioral Healthcare are among our “model” collaborative partners that have allowed our organization to enhance our service system. Collaborative efforts will continue as the transformation of federal, state, and local fiscal environment continues.

Veterans Services – Many veterans returning from conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan are experiencing significant long-term adjustment difficulties. Serenity House has been collaborating with the federal government and our partners in the VA to insure that our community has appropriate services to meet this important need. Fortunately, Representative John Mica remains a champion of this effort and we anticipate that his advocacy will be instrumental in our campaign to increase veterans’ access to essential treatment and support services.

Florida Department of Corrections Partnership – Serenity House anticipates entering into enhanced partnerships with the Florida Department of Corrections (FDOC) as our focus upon developing safe and sober housing opportunities coincides with FDOC’s interests in supporting community efforts that reduce recidivism and enhance public safety. Emerging research continues to document the fiscal value of providing community-based services when compared to simply constructing more state prison beds.

Challenges

Affordable Housing – Every community is experiencing difficulty in providing adequate affordable housing for the homeless and the working poor. Individuals historically considered part of the middle class, including some Serenity House staff members, are having difficulty accessing safe, affordable housing. In a nation of substantial wealth and resources, we must address this challenge in order to achieve a desirable quality of life in our communities.

Research – While access to data-based outcome research regarding treatment effectiveness is imperative, few grants provide financial support for such research. Without data documenting the impact of treatment and the return on investment of public funds, the future viability of non-profit, charitable organizations can be jeopardized.

Operating Expense Increases – State-contracted agencies like Serenity House have not received a “cost of living” increase in over 10 years. With escalating costs related to corporate insurance, employee health coverage, fuel, and utility rates, a potential reduction in services remains an unwelcome alternative in responding to cost pressures of this nature.

Succession Planning – In the field of behavioral health, a generation of professionals who entered the field in the 1970’s are nearing retirement. As this generation “matures out” of the field, organizations like Serenity House need to be prepared to provide a smooth and orderly transition to a new generation of managers and executives.

Comments By Veterans

SERVED IN THE SERENITY HOUSE HOMELESS TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM

"During my stay I have seen men arrive with their faces lit up with hope and relief. To have a clean bed to sleep in and food to eat is such a blessing to us who have fallen by the wayside. To have another chance at life is truly a gift. All of us, I am sure, want to thank those responsible for this caring program."

"I was homeless for about one year before coming here. This program has turned my life around and started me back on the right track. If you could help and get the needed funding...I'm sure that more veterans would benefit from it."

"I am a 22-year service vet in the U.S. Army and Army Reserve that also served in the Persian Gulf.....The V.A. Transitional program has opened not only the door, but also gave me hope....This program is the best alternative for those in need of a temporary roof, and help to those serving in ongoing wars."

"This place is giving me a chance to learn how to live without drinking every day. Rehab helped me but it didn't give me the skills to live back in society...I wish there (were) more places like this because I know there are a lot more people out there who need help. They don't look very far for help because there is very little out there. Thanks for helping us."

"The VA Transitional House is a great place for me to be. I was homeless and not even trying to get a job....Now I am actively seeking employment and have a good place to live....there are a lot of homeless veterans that could use a place like this."

"In the last twenty years I have been in four different Rehabs in four different cities. Each time upon completion, I walk(ed) out only to find myself with few options, none of them good, and each time I ended up back on the streets. This transitional house has changed all that. Now I have the one thing that is an imperative for my success, and that is hope."

Awards

Tom Hoffman Award

The Tom Hoffman Award recognizes a special friend of Serenity House in honor of Tom Hoffman's service to the organization. Tom served as a Board member from 1988 until his untimely death in 2002. Tom's generous nature, kind spirit, and deep wisdom were instrumental in Serenity House's evolution as an important community resource. Tom's resolve to put the clients' needs as the priority in organizational decisions remains his greatest legacy.

Sam Bell Award

The Sam Bell Award recognizes an elected official who has demonstrated a special commitment in support of the Serenity House mission. Sam Bell, a former speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, was an early state level Serenity House supporter who utilized his political savvy to advocate for increased funding and support of the mission. Without Mr. Bell's advocacy, several of the current treatment facilities would not have been constructed or renovated. Sam remains an active advocate and friend of Serenity House as a well-respected lobbyist in Tallahassee.

Bill Guy Award

The Bill Guy Award recognizes a Board member who has made significant contributions to the fulfillment of the Serenity House mission. The award is named after William Carrington Guy, a former long-term Board member, who was a generous supporter of Serenity House programs and staff during challenging times. An accomplished journalist, Bill's ancestors included a General in the Revolutionary War and the founder of the first newspaper in Richmond, Virginia. Bill gave freely of his time, talents, and personal resources in his commitment to spreading the word of recovery.

Gerald R. Woodard Award

The Gerald R. Woodard Award recognizes an individual or organization associated with the healthcare service system that has provided exemplary services to clients served by Serenity House. Dr. Gerald "Chip" Woodard has generously served as Serenity House Medical Director since 1992. Dr. Woodard's expertise in addictions and his sensitivity in meeting the medical needs of Serenity House clients serves as a model for healthcare professionals.

Reid Hughes Award

The Reid Hughes Award recognizes the unique contributions of a staff member who displays the entrepreneurial drive and leadership of Reid Hughes in an effort to further the mission of Serenity House. Reid Hughes has served on the Board of Directors since 1992 and has been a tireless champion of our "ministry" provided to clients with the most complex needs. As a well-respected philanthropist and generous donor of his time and talents, Reid has provided leadership in the development of a planned-giving campaign and the development of strategies which lead to long-term organizational stability. This award will be presented at the annual staff appreciation event in December, 2008.

Sam Mitchell Award

The Sam Mitchell Award is presented annually to a staff member for exemplary performance during the year. Sam Mitchell, Executive Director of Serenity House from 1982 through 1996, provided leadership to the agency during the most crucial years of the organization's evolution. Sam's commitment to the mission was primarily as an unpaid volunteer, mostly focused upon insuring that the most vulnerable, most needy individuals in our community received access to quality services. Sam's support of staff and clients is truly represented by honoring a staff member for commitment to the cause. This award will be presented at the annual staff appreciation event in December, 2008.

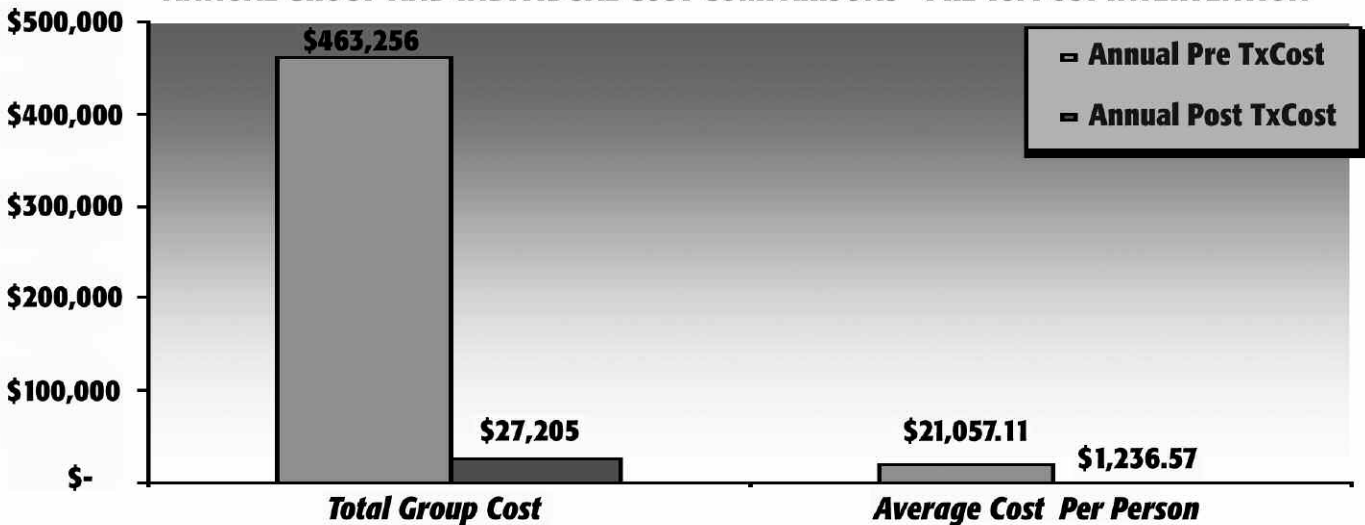

Housing Impact Study

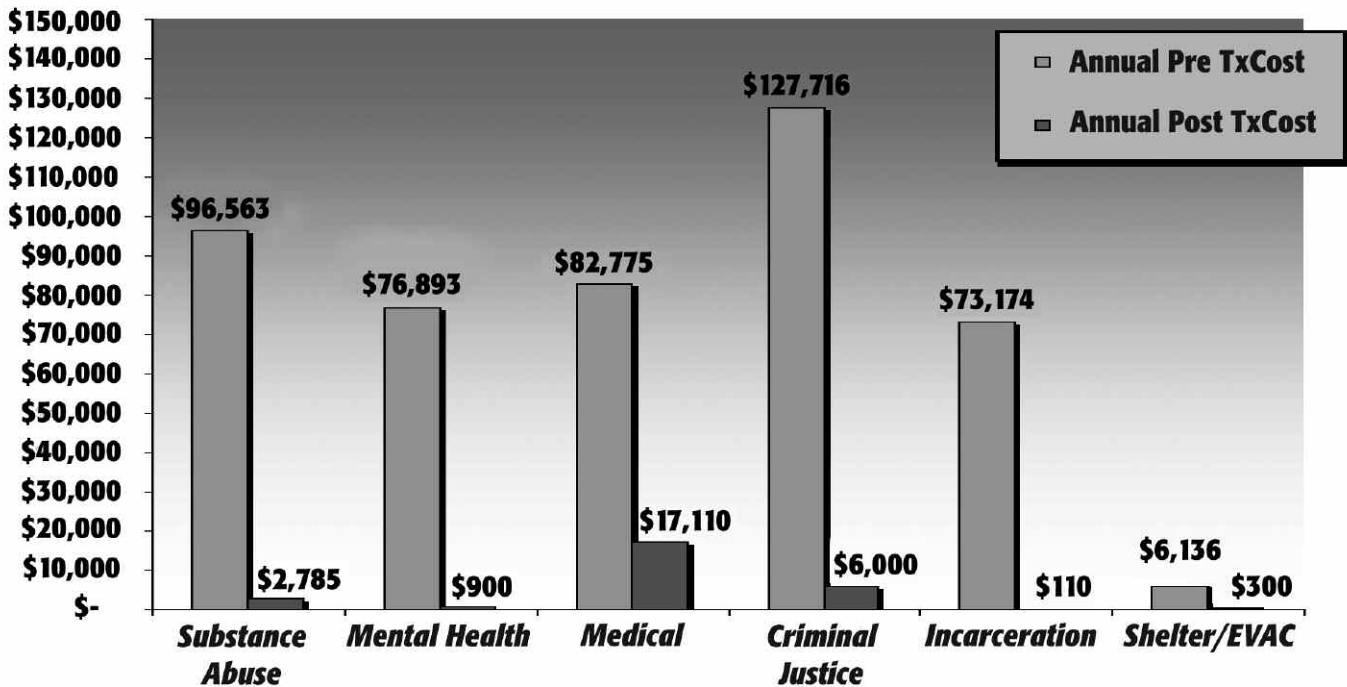
Preliminary Findings

In 2008, Serenity House staff conducted a cost-impact study of the differences in public costs for twenty-two (22) formerly chronically homeless individuals for a fifteen (15) year period while homeless, in comparison to a two (2) year period after access to treatment/housing. The pre-treatment / post-housing costs were annualized to insure an accurate comparison of costs. The annualized public cost for the participants during the period that they were homeless was \$21,057 per year, per participant. The same annualized public costs for these individuals after receiving access to treatment and housing was \$1,236 per person. Thus, public costs for these services decreased by 94.2% as a result of access to treatment and supportive housing (see below).

Post intervention utilization of public services decreased by the following percentages compared to the period of homelessness: Substance Abuse 92.3% decrease, Mental Health 91% decrease, Criminal Justice 98% decrease, Medical 86% decrease, Incarcerations 100% decrease, Emergency Shelters 100% decrease, Emergency Transport 78% decrease.
