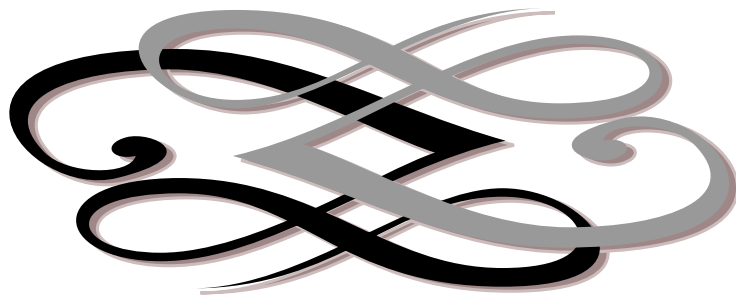

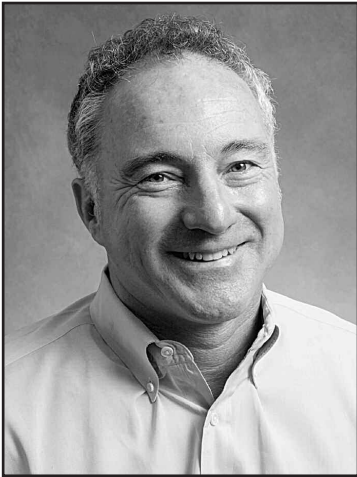

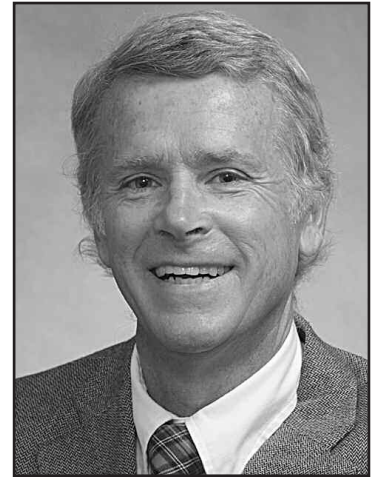

On behalf of the Serenity House of Volusia Board of Directors and staff, it is truly a pleasure to present you with our leadership message in celebration of our 31 years of contributions to our community. Our organization's success is a direct consequence of the dedicated leadership of our governing Board of Directors who, as volunteers, insure that organizational goals and resources remain focused upon fulfillment of our mission.

We also recognize that our staff's partnership with those we serve is the fundamental source of our accomplishments. Our staff display an incredible level of personal and professional commitment to help the most vulnerable members of our community, especially those with limited personal and financial resources.

We also want to publicly recognize the contributions of our continually expanding base of supporters and friends – some who generously provide financial support, others who donate their time and expertise, and others who advocate for our services.

We have achieved several significant accomplishments this year that we want to share with our friends and supporters:

- After several years of planning and advocacy from supporters throughout our community, Serenity House was awarded \$278,845 in funding to implement a comprehensive correctional diversion program. This program will identify, assess, and treat non-violent offenders who are determined by the judiciary to be appropriate for participation. Anticipated outcomes include lowered recidivism, increased employment, access to supportive housing and family reunification. An independent evaluation will report our success in achieving these outcomes and determining the savings to taxpayers which accrue from this program.
- The Boards of Directors of Serenity House and Community Outreach Services have demonstrated admirable foresight in determining that a corporate merger is in the best interest of the community served by both organizations. The Boards and management staff are undertaking the due diligence and planning required to affect a merger by June 30, 2010. The anticipated impact of this corporate reconfiguration will be increased service capacity, enhanced administrative efficiency and an increased competitive position.
- In 2008-09, Serenity House has continued to be a leader in developing safe, affordable housing for needy, high-risk individuals. In collaboration with local and state governments, Serenity House now manages 96 community housing beds which directly improves our tenants' ability to become productive, tax paying citizens of our community.

NOTABLE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Serenity House achievements in the last year include:

Community Housing Development Projects – Serenity House has become a state-wide leader in implementing new safe and affordable housing projects in partnership with local governments. Serenity House currently has developed over 90 safe, affordable community housing beds through this important private/public partnership. During FY 08-09, the Serenity House executive team members have provided consultation to several entities in the establishment of affordable housing in addressing homelessness.

Legislative Advocacy – This year's legislative session can only be termed an unqualified success! After an extended session, the legislature voted to restore 100% of substance abuse and mental health funding. This outcome is a direct result of the tremendous advocacy expressed by supporters of the Serenity House mission, community partners and substance abuse and mental health providers throughout the state. Serenity House Board members, staff, clients and community supporters have been active advocates for our programs which proves once again that, working together, our advocacy really does have impact.

Corporate Merger Progress – In an effort to insure that local substance abuse and mental health providers are achieving optimal efficiencies and effectiveness, the Serenity House Board of Directors approved the pursuit of a corporate merger with Community Outreach Services Inc. Senior administrators of both organizations have consulted with their respective Board members and staff to discuss the merger and explore methods to enhance our agency's working relationships in strengthening the missions of the two organizations. This effort is strongly supported by the major funding agents of both organizations: Florida's Department of Children and Families, the County of Volusia, and the United Way of Volusia/Flagler.

Community Homeless Partnerships – Through a partnership with Stewart-Marchman-Act and HUD, Serenity House has entered into a lease on a 12 bed facility to serve homeless women and their children. This will allow for opportunities to secure additional grant funding in order to renovate the Serenity House Tanglewood facility. Through a partnership with the City of Daytona Beach, Serenity House renovated a facility located in the core area of the city to create six permanent housing apartments for chronically homeless individuals. These efforts, combined with the Serenity House community housing projects, further our community's progress in moving the chronically homeless from the streets into safe, supportive housing.

Jail / Community Diversion Programming – Through a long-term effort of the Serenity House Board of Directors, the judiciary, local faith community and in partnership with Volusia County, Serenity House received \$278,000 of federal funding to support enhanced residential, outpatient, in-jail and court advocacy programming to address the issue of unacceptably high recidivism among drug abusing offenders. Services began October 1, 2009.

Public Support – During the past twelve months, our supporters have provided a remarkable increase in financial support for our clients and programs. Our fundraising efforts generated over \$400,000 in cash donations and over \$380,000 in in-kind donations. This community support is used to match federal, state, and local grants and allows Serenity House to provide ancillary services to clients that are not available through traditional treatment funding sources.

NOTABLE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Continued

Public Education – Our efforts to increase the public’s awareness of the benefits of treatment and the impact Serenity House services have continued throughout FY 08-09. Examples include:

- Multiple presentations to neighborhood community groups;
- Co-authoring an Op-Ed piece with Chet Bell (SMA), Mark Fontaine (FADAA) in the [Daytona Beach News-Journal](#) regarding the need for continued state support of our substance abuse system of care;
- Testimony before Florida’s House Health Care Appropriations Committee in Tallahassee regarding the positive findings from the Serenity House cost impact study;
- Training criminal justice professionals of the 7th Judicial Circuit regarding the role of substance abuse and mental health treatment in diverting targeted offenders into appropriate treatment settings;
- Training members of the faith community on “Conducting Comprehensive Substance Abuse Assessments”;
- Ron Zimmet, local attorney and former Serenity House Board member, has prepared a presentation regarding the positive impact of providing interventions to the most vulnerable members of our community which are being offered to community groups in conjunction with the Serenity House Foundation Board.
- Extensive positive media coverage including an article titled “Instilling Hope” was published which described our efforts in helping a formerly homeless family of four gain access to permanent housing through our CHDO programming.
- A major article in the [Daytona Beach News-Journal](#) on the growing need for additional women’s residential treatment and featured the successes of several women participating in our High Street and Tanglewood programs.
- A lead editorial in the [News-Journal](#) discussed the opportunity for our community to examine additional funding sources for the expansion of treatment services for women.

This media coverage represents an ongoing campaign by our organization to educate the public regarding the value of treatment and the need to insure that funding reductions spare services directed to the most vulnerable members of our community.

Correctional Intervention Advisory Council – A new Correctional Advisory Council was formed in collaboration with the Volusia County Council and 7th Circuit Judiciary to oversee the new Serenity House Correctional Intervention program. Advisory Council members include three judges, representatives of the Public Defenders and State Attorney’s offices, Chair of the Volusia County Council member, the Director of Volusia County Corrections, CEO of Stewart-Marchman-Act and Serenity House clinical and administrative staff. One Voice for Volusia will be conducting an independent evaluation of the program. This Advisory Council will meet regularly to insure successful program implementation and compliance with anticipated outcomes.

BRAIVE Foundation Funding – Volusia and Flagler Counties were awarded a \$240,000 grant through the BRAIVE Foundation to expand mental health and substance abuse treatment access to Iraqi and Afghanistan war veterans and their families. The local United Way is administering this funding and is working closely with veteran groups and community treatment providers in service implementation. Serenity House is receiving funding to provide access to residential treatment for targeted veterans and their family members in need of this care.

— OPPORTUNITIES FOR ENHANCEMENT —

Drug Court Enhancement – Working closely with Stewart-Marchman-Act, the office of 7th Judicial Circuit Court Administration, Volusia County and members of the Judiciary, Serenity House has expanded access to care for individuals engaged in local Drug Court programs. Based upon the documented positive impact of these programs, it is anticipated that future state and federal support will be available for the expansion of these efforts.

Women Veterans – There is growing documentation of an increased demand for substance abuse and mental health treatment for female veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. Currently, access to care for these women is limited. There appears to be several opportunities to work with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Defense in expanding services to this deserving population.

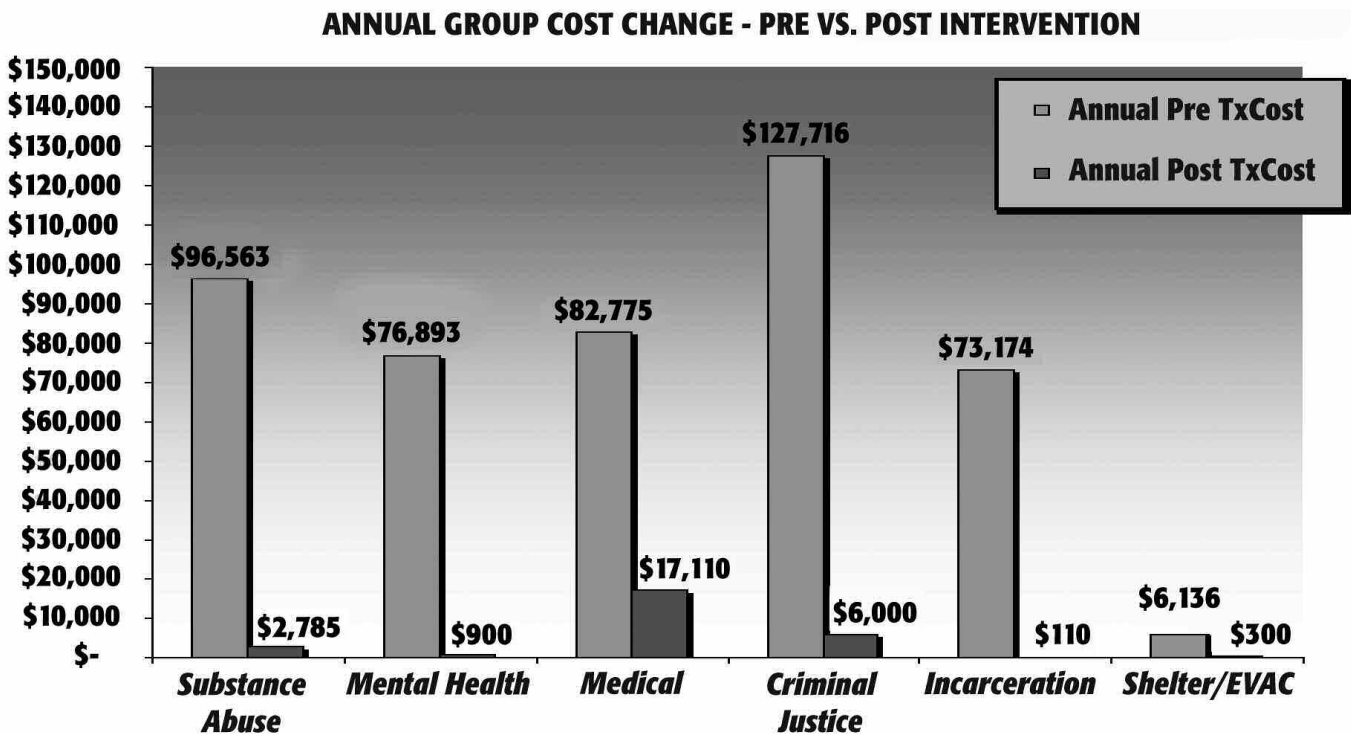
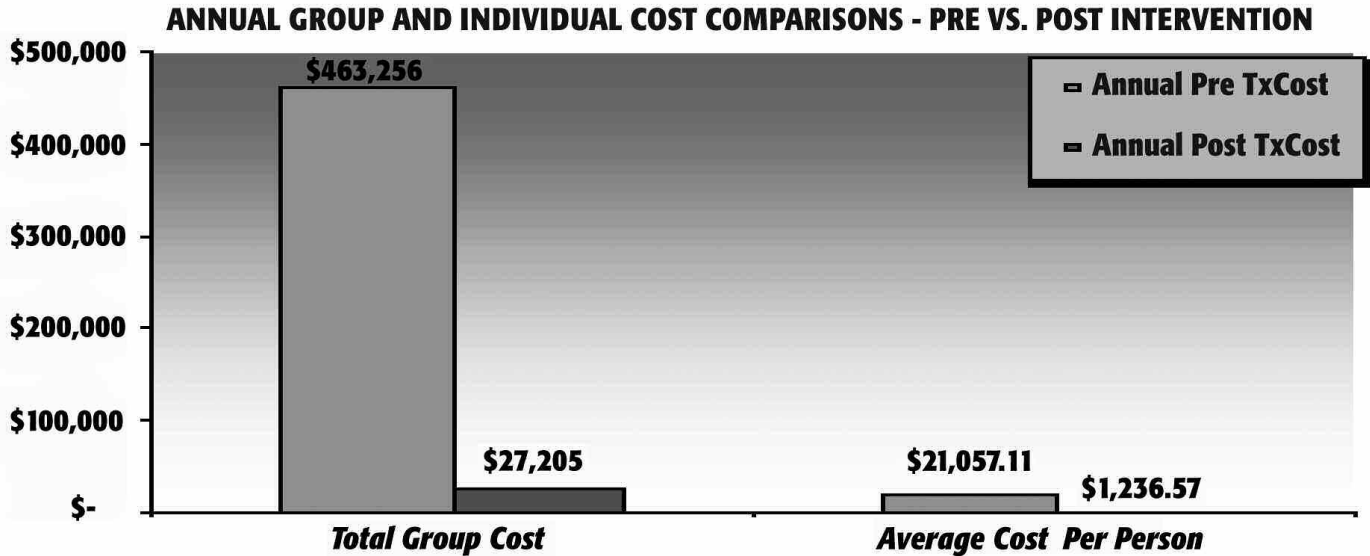
Prison Diversion – Florida, like many states, is gradually recognizing that simply constructing more prison and jail beds does not solve the problem of crime. Based upon models implemented in other states as well as outcome data from Florida's Department of Corrections, new strategies to target and divert selected offenders from incarceration to treatment is an opportunity for a smarter, more cost effective approach in addressing this issue. Emerging research continues to document the fiscal value of providing community-based services when compared to simply constructing more correctional institutions.

Community Collaboration – As securing additional treatment funding becomes more challenging, opportunities are emerging for organizations with similar missions to develop partnerships to increase efficiencies and reduce duplication of effort. The Serenity House Board of Directors remains committed to expanding our collaborative partnerships. Serenity House is continuing our model partnerships with local providers such as Halifax Medical Center, Palmer Chiropractic College, Stewart-Marchman-Act, the Homeless Coalition, and the Behavioral Health Consortium in enhancing our service system. Collaborative efforts will continue as the transformation of federal, state, and local fiscal environment continues.

COST IMPACT STUDY

Preliminary Findings

In 2008, Serenity House staff conducted a cost-impact study of the differences in public costs for twenty-two (22) formerly chronically homeless individuals for a fifteen (15) year period while homeless, in comparison to a two (2) year period after access to treatment/housing. The pre-treatment / post-housing costs were annualized to insure an accurate comparison of costs. The annualized public cost for the participants during the period that they were homeless was \$21,057 per year, per participant. The same annualized public costs for these individuals after receiving access to treatment and housing was \$1,236 per person. Thus, public costs for these services decreased by 94.2% as a result of access to treatment and supportive housing (see below).



Post intervention utilization of public services decreased by the following percentages compared to the period of homelessness: Substance Abuse 92.3% decrease, Mental Health 91% decrease, Criminal Justice 98% decrease, Medical 86% decrease, Incarcerations 100% decrease, Emergency Shelters 100% decrease, Emergency Transport 78% decrease.

In 1978, several individuals embraced a vision to create an organization that was committed to care for the most vulnerable members of the community regardless of income, disability, or previous failure to achieve recovery. Over thirty years later, these principles continue to guide the Serenity House mission.

WHO WE SERVE

We serve Veterans.

“During my stay I have seen men arrive with their faces lit up with hope and relief. To have a clean bed to sleep in and food to eat is such a blessing to us who have fallen by the wayside. To have another chance at life is truly a gift. All of us, I am sure, want to thank those responsible for this caring program.”

“I am a 22-year service vet in the U.S. Army and Army Reserve that also served in the Persian Gulf....The V.A. Transitional program has opened not only the door, but also gave me hope....This program is the best alternative for those in need of a temporary roof, and help to those serving in ongoing wars.”

“This place is giving me a chance to learn how to live without drinking every day. Rehab helped me but it didn’t give me the skills to live back in society...I wish there (were) more places like this because I know there are a lot more people out there who need help. They don’t look very far for help because there is very little out there. Thanks for helping us.”

“The VA Transitional House is a great place for me to be. I was homeless and not even trying to get a job....Now I am actively seeking employment and have a good place to live....there are a lot of homeless veterans that could use a place like this.”

We serve the homeless.

“I was homeless for about one year before coming here. This program has turned my life around and started me back on the right track. If you could help and get the needed funding...I’m sure that more veterans would benefit from it.”

“I’m an addict. Six months ago, I was homeless, helpless, and hopeless. My state of mind and body were like broken egg shells. I prayed for God to take me as I felt like I was living in hell. I had little strength left to carry on, there was really no reason to. But now... I’m becoming self-sufficient! That pitiful man that walked through the door six months ago is no longer pitiful. I have a new life and choices to make – wow, I actually have choices! I was spared for some reason. Others should be spared also – it just takes more room at treatment. Thank God there was room for me.”

WHAT WE DO

We build self-esteem.

“When I first came into this program I knew that I needed to change my life, but I didn’t know how. I was a sad, angry person full of resentments and self pity. I had fear and anxiety of my future and so much guilt from my past that I hated my life. I blamed others for my problems and misfortunes because I couldn’t handle the guilt that comes from taking responsibility for my faults and character defects. I was truly a lost soul. I have learned to take responsibility for my past mistakes and to forgive myself. Guilt no longer controls my life. My self-esteem has been elevated through helping others and by receiving their help. Somehow, my anger has disappeared and in its place is a level of peace and joy that I never felt was possible. I truly love myself and others today as a result of experiencing treatment at Serenity House.”

We offer respect.

“Upon arriving I was treated with love and respect I felt I did not deserve. The staff really cared, also I felt as I was treated as an individual, not just another body. All of my needs were assessed not just separation from alcohol. The staff and Serenity House treat recovery regarding the whole person, the primary of which is addiction , but also the spiritual needs we all have, fully preparing us for life when we leave here – which is imperative to our future recovery. I want to thank all of those involved with Serenity with undying gratitude for the “hand-up” I have received and direction that I have gained to rejoin society as an asset and not a liability.”

We provide hope.

“In the last twenty years I have been in four different rehabs in four different cities. Each time upon completion, I walk(ed) out only to find myself with few options, none of them good, and each time I ended up back on the streets. Serenity House has changed all that. Now I have the one thing that is an imperative for my success, and that is hope.”

“Before I entered treatment my life was nothing but misery and depression. I was going nowhere positive fast and headed for trouble. Being at Serenity House has allowed me to finish my physical detox in a safe place. My body and brain have been given a chance to start healing. My memory, intellect, good attitude, and sense of humor are returning. My counselor has pointed me in the right direction by teaching me to be humble, open minded, willing to learn, and willing to follow directions. My future includes –sticking with the program and my recovery, using the steps to live by, and getting back with my children.”

We mend families.

“I want to thank you for the important role you play in making it possible for families to have hope after a love one has fallen prey to the grip of addiction. For many, you are the only life raft. My reason for writing is to point out that you are helping not only the men and women served by Serenity House. The ones who are hurt most by alcoholism and drug addiction don’t even drink or do drugs. I’m speaking of the children in these families. There is no safe haven for the children of drug and alcohol abusing parents. ***And that, my friends, is why your mission is so important.*** God bless you for what you are doing. You will probably never fully know the difference that you are making. With deepest appreciation.”

AWARDS

“Tom Hoffman Award”

The Tom Hoffman Award recognizes a special friend of Serenity House in honor of Tom Hoffman’s service to the organization. Tom served as a Board member from 1988 until his untimely death in 2002. Tom’s generous nature, kind spirit, and deep wisdom were instrumental in Serenity House’s evolution as an important community resource. Tom’s resolve to put the clients’ needs as the priority in organizational decisions remains his greatest legacy.

“Sam Bell Award”

The Sam Bell Award recognizes an elected official who has demonstrated a special commitment in support of the Serenity House mission. Sam Bell, a former speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, was an early state level Serenity House supporter who utilized his political savvy to advocate for increased funding and support of the mission. Without Mr. Bell’s advocacy, several of the current treatment facilities would not have been constructed or renovated. Sam remains an active advocate and friend of Serenity House as a well-respected lobbyist in Tallahassee.

“Bill Guy Award”

The Bill Guy Award recognizes a Board member who has made significant contributions to the fulfillment of the Serenity House mission. The award is named after William Carrington Guy, a former long-term Board member, who was a generous supporter of Serenity House programs and staff during challenging times. An accomplished journalist, Bill’s ancestors included a General in the Revolutionary War and the founder of the first newspaper in Richmond, Virginia. Bill gave freely of his time, talents, and personal resources in his commitment to spreading the word of recovery.

“Gerald R. Woodard Award”

The Gerald R. Woodard Award recognizes an individual or organization associated with the healthcare service system that has provided exemplary services to clients served by Serenity House. Dr. Gerald “Chip” Woodard has generously served as Serenity House Medical Director since 1992. Dr. Woodard’s expertise in addictions and his sensitivity in meeting the medical needs of Serenity House clients serves as a model for healthcare professionals.

“Reid Hughes Award”

The Reid Hughes Award recognizes the unique contributions of a staff member who displays the entrepreneurial drive and leadership of Reid Hughes in an effort to further the mission of Serenity House. Reid Hughes has served on the Board of Directors since 1992 and has been a tireless champion of our “ministry” provided to clients with the most complex needs. As a well-respected philanthropist and generous donor of his time and talents, Reid has provided leadership in the development of a planned-giving campaign and the development of strategies which lead to long-term organizational stability. This award will be presented at the annual staff appreciation event in December, 2009.

“Sam Mitchell Award”

The Sam Mitchell Award is presented annually to a staff member for exemplary performance during the year. Sam Mitchell, Executive Director of Serenity House from 1982 through 1996, provided leadership to the agency during the most crucial years of the organization’s evolution. Sam’s commitment to the mission was primarily as an unpaid volunteer, mostly focused upon insuring that the most vulnerable, most needy individuals in our community received access to quality services. Sam’s support of staff and clients is truly represented by honoring a staff member for commitment to the cause. This award will be presented at the annual staff appreciation event in December, 2009.

Upon successful completion of this component the sentence is amended and the inmate is released to community based treatment. While in the community, the client will continue to attend treatment and receive intensive case management and court liaison services for up to a year.
